Dr. Mike Cuffe will visit Duke April 20-21. Dr. Cuffe is the president of the Physician Services Group for Nashville, Tennessee-based Healthcare Corporation of America, or HCA. His group currently oversees more than 9,000 providers.

Dr. Cuffe has a long history with Duke. He completed his MD, residency, fellowship, and an MBA at Duke. After his fellowship, Dr. Cuffe's roles included vice president for ambulatory services and chief medical officer for Duke University Health System; vice president, medical affairs of Duke University Health System; and vice dean for medical affairs of the Duke University School of Medicine. He left Duke for HCA in 2011.

Dr. Cuffe's visit will include a lunchtime lecture with the fellows and a fellows-only dinner at Parizade. He will meet with fellows individually by appointment and also with former colleagues.
