

# **Cuffe Visiting Professorship Brings Outsider and Insider Perspectives**

Fellows got a fresh look at Duke, career development, and the state of U.S. healthcare when Dr. Mike Cuffe came to campus as the DUCCS visiting professor.

Dr. Cuffe is the president of the Physician Services Group for Healthcare Corporation of America, or HCA. HCA is a for-profit hospital network based in

Nashville, Tennessee, with sites across the country and in the U.K. The Physician Services Group currently oversees more than 9,000 providers.





The itinerary for Dr. Cuffe's visit included meetings with high-powered former Duke colleagues, including Tom Owens, Vice President for Medical Affairs and Chief Medical Officer for Duke University Health System; Kevin Schulman, Director of the Center for Clinical and Genetic Economics and Associate Director of DCRI; and his own former mentor, Joseph Greenfield. But the bulk of his time and energy went to Duke cardiology fellows.

At a lunchtime lecture, Dr. Cuffe introduced 12 fellows to HCA's vision and approach and offered his own views on the state of U.S. hospitals. His perspective was straightforward, easy to understand, and as much influenced by his time at the Fuqua School of Business as by his many years as a Duke medical student, resident, fellow, and hospital administrator.

The discussion continued in one-on-one fellow meetings—Dr. Cuffe held nearly as many meetings with fellows as with DCRI and Hospital leadership—and culminated in a fellows-only dinner at Durham's Café Parizade. This was Dr. Cuffe's first visit to the medical side of Duke since 2011, and fellows and colleagues alike were both honored and energized by his time here.

#### **Clinical Interests:**

Percutaneous interventions for structural heart disease (TAVR, mitraclip, and left atrial appendage closure) and percutaneous coronary intervention (PCI), in particular radial artery access PCI.

Research Interests: The evaluation of novel percutaneous therapies to treat valvular heart disease, sarcopenia as a



predictor of TAVR outcomes, methods to increase diversity in clinical research, clinical outcomes of women and minorities following PCI.
